VainEgo features a series of 108 ceramic heads described by Gough as an 'Army of me', as well as film, drawings and photographic prints. All the featured works were made during a 6-year period which was triggered by Yurim Gough's breast cancer diagnosis in 2016, and her subsequent treatment and recovery. During this challenging time, Gough sought solace in her work, expressing the emotions and experiences of her cancer treatment through life drawing and ceramics.

Yurim Gough says: "The Vain Ego project was a 100% cathartic process. Focusing on creativity was a great tool to release emotions, weakness and pain, especially after I found that I had breast cancer and the subsequent treatment and recovery. I also got a strong spiritual feeling from the creative process and that I was able to survive from the cancer journey. Vain Ego consists of one word and depicts myself in the mirror looking for my ego. As the fight against cancer began, I drew my feelings, which changed from day to day, and I also drew my changing body nude onto a ceramic bowl. In addition, photographs and videos of myself at that time will also be presented for the first time in this exhibition."

Gough is a talented fine art ceramicist who merges the draughtsmanship and gender fluid mind-set of Grayson Perry with the autobiographical honesty of Tracey Emin. Gough was born in South Korea where she had a successful early career as a shoe designer, working in Tokyo and London, before moving to the UK where she pursued a career as a fine artist and ended up settling in Cambridge where she has a studio.

As well as the VainEgo exhibition at APT Gallery, curated by Lee Sharrock, Gough is going to be featured in a major group show at the prestigious Fondation d'entreprise Bernardaud in Limoges from June 2022 to March 2023. Limoges is the famed centre of ceramics where Picasso made some of his most iconic ceramic works. Gough will exhibit nine pieces from her Gender-Fluid series in Limoges.

VainEgo 1 (Born)



I was born in 1976 in the winter, on the longest night of the year.

My name is the name that my mother gave to me. 'Yu' or 宥 meaning generous and 'Rim' or 臨 meaning pro; forming 'Yurim' which means merciful.

My life began in the countryside, in the Gangwon province in South Korea.

VainEgo 2 (Paper Dolls)



At the age of five, I had collected close to one hundred paper dolls of people. I cut out the dolls from sheets of paper and clothed them with pretty clothes and trinkets, and imagined the lives of the different characters.

I remember that one day I was sent to the supermarket with my mother 's purse to buy some food, and I used the change to buy a paper doll. I was supposed to return the change to my mother...

Later, when I grew up and had a career as a fashion designer, I laughed at myself still cutting and pasting imagery from magazines for my work, just as I did while I was playing with my childhood paper dolls.

VainEgo 3 (Houses)



During my childhood, my mother and I had no home. I remember moving to a new place and moving quickly. I moved almost every year to a different place in the same small country village.

My mother was a woman without a husband, and everybody in that place looked down on my mother. In Korea, at that time, without a man people were free to treat her very badly. Correct and brave mothers have to fight for right and wrong from time to time, and as a result, we were kicked out every time over an unexpected quarrel with the owner of the house.

VainEgo 4 (Book)



At age 11 my writing was selected for the Pyeongchang in the Gangwon province convention and came out in print in a book. I still keep this book titled "Small Day Bigger". In the story, written on the bowl, I promised my mother that I would give her warm gloves and that I would take care of her forever. But I now live very far away from her.

VainEgo 5 (Snow)



My early years in the countryside were full of beautiful surroundings. The four seasons can be felt clearly even with my eyes closed.

In the last of the seasons, the world is covered with new white snow and at the beginning of a winter night when the moon is round and big, the outside is as bright and calm as daylight... The night that the church bell rang, my mother and I dressed up beautifully, dipped our feet in the snow, and headed to the church on the hill. That Christmas is kept in my happiness bottle.

We moved to Uijeongbu, a city near Seoul, and the place where I first stayed was a large area of buildings, like a refugee village. After a family died from carbon monoxide poisoning, I moved into my Aunt's house for a few years until I finished school. The cheap underfloor heating, which they needed to survive the brutal sub-zero winter temperatures in those temporary buildings, meant that they needed to burn charcoal indoors.

Thinking about the souls who had to die from burning those cylinders of charcoal...

VainEgo 15 (Shoes Designer)

It wasn't easy to get a job because I wasn't a university graduate. I was also really upset about the severe economic problems.

Having not been paid for three months, I started to work in the evenings at a cocktail bar in Uijeongbu, not far from Seoul, where I was living with my mum. I worked every day until midnight and slept no more than five hours. It was a very hard time working day by day.

Eventually the shoe design company was forced to close, so I had to look for other shoe design companies and ended up doing a string of design jobs in an unstable economy.

Every time I submitted my CV to new companies, I was so embarrassed and aware that I had not lasted long with any company yet.

After surviving for three years of working through such a crisis, I started working as a total accessory designer for a popular clothing brand called OZOC in 2000. This was a Japanese brand in Korea, and I went on business trips to Japan many times, which is how I became very interested in Japan and Japanese culture.

I was a popular accessory designer for three years, and my handbag and shoe designs were in high demand, and I was often interviewed for fashion magazines in Korea at the time.

VainEgo 16 (Shoes Business)

Based on various experiences, I had grasped the overall shoe industry.

That's how I was able to start my own business. One of the shoe manufacturers provided me with an office and made my designs. They were very successful and were sold to more than 20 clothing brands; the largest order was from a company that exported shoes to Japan. I think the Japanese liked my designs.

I made a huge profit in just one year. Although I was doing very well, I wanted to explore and experience bigger and different things in my life. I thought it would be good to go to Japan and learn Japanese so that I could communicate directly with Japanese companies and make my business more prosperous.

The people around me thought that I was not in my right mind. They couldn't believe that I was going to go to Japan and close such a successful business... I think they could not appreciate my vision.

VainEgo 17 (Japan)

I spent half of the day at the Naganuma Japanese School in Shibuya, and I also studied at home, spending a total of 15 hours a day learning Japanese. I was so proud of myself that I got to level 2 in Japanese in six months. My auntie, who lives in Japan, was very impressed by it.

When I left my mother for a few years for the first time, to go to Japan, I brought a rosary to protect my mind, even though I have no religion, and I also brought a sketchbook that looked like a Bible. I started drawing a picture diary in the sketchbook. One day I would draw a vivid image of a dream, and another day a line in random directions, without thinking. I drew portraits of new friends and the people surrounding me.

VainEgo 18 (Shoes Garden)



During the year that I spent in Japan, I had a strong desire for shoe design, and this led me to organise a shoe design exhibition. With the help of a shoe company that I once worked for in Korea, I made shoe samples and held an exhibition called "Shoes Garden" on top of an antique shop Cafe in Daigangyama, in Tokyo. It was just a one-day show, but it was a really a pleasant time.
